

The Rev. Dr. Alice Hunt is a biblical scholar, leader in theological and higher education, and activist around justice issues. She is the Executive Director of the American Academy of Religion based in Atlanta. Prior to that, she served as president of Chicago Theological Seminary as the twelfth president in the 158-year history of the school. Prior to moving to Chicago, Dr. Hunt served as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at Vanderbilt University Divinity School. And before that, she was a systems analyst for NASA contractors.

Dr. Hunt holds the Ph.D. in Religion, with an emphasis on the Hebrew Bible, from Vanderbilt University. Her published work includes *Missing Priests: The Zadokites in Tradition and History* (2006) and two edited volumes, *Second Temple Studies IV: Historiography and History* (2012) and *Focusing Biblical Studies: The Crucial Nature of the Persian and Hellenistic*



*Periods: Essays in Honor of Douglas A. Knight* (2012) as well as numerous essays. Her current research focuses on white privilege and white supremacy as well as biblical interpretations in contemporary contexts. She also writes and speaks in these areas: white privilege, male privilege, interdependence, and leadership for transformation.

Dr. Hunt was ordained at the historic Fifteenth Avenue Baptist Church, National Baptist Convention, in Nashville, Tennessee. She holds dual standing with the United Church of Christ in the Chicago Metropolitan Association. She serves on the United Church of Christ Board. She holds degrees from the University of Montevallo (B.S.) and Vanderbilt University (M.T.S., M.A., Ph.D.) Involved in the broader issues of religious affairs and theological education, Hunt serves on the Board of Commissioners for the Association of Theological Schools of the United States and Canada. She chaired the Historical Books section for the Society of Biblical Literature's international meeting. She also chaired the American Academy of Religion Committee on the Status of Women in the Profession and has served on the board of directors and executive committee for the American Academy of Religion.
